coffee table should offer as much eye candy as your dressing table or mantelpiece. Quality hardback books look stylish when strategically stacked in neat piles. However, choosing the right books is essential. We ask five interior designers for their coffee-table essentials:



Class Act — William Haines: Legendary Hollywood Decorator by Peter Schifando and Jean H Mathison (Pointed Leaf Press, 224pp, \$95) Martin Kemp, creative

director of Martin Kemp Design, says: "Class Act is a rewarding book, not least because it captures many facets of design together with an insight into the designer's life - William Haines. He was originally a silent movie star, renowned in the genre, however with the onset of - and rumours about his private life - he realised he had to diversify and entered set design. This eventually led him to cross paths again with the movie stars who took to his eye for detail and characterful personality, subsequently employing him to design their homes. Haines was given the outlet to produce some of the design world's most iconic interiors and furniture pieces, many now deemed timeless and 'classic', and used in my work today.

"His work has a huge variety of style, from the ebullient and decorative to streamlined deco. His attention to detail is to be respected as a lesson in restraint as well as elegance. I refer to this book on many occasions and salute the great author of its works within."

interiors book that doesn't just inspire me but also shows me how to do certain projects. We all love to improve our homes but this can be especially challenging if you have a landlord or are short of funds. Home for Now by Joanna Thornhill is the perfect book if this is your home life.

"It is packed full of inspiration but also shows you how to achieve the style without breaking the bank. Working through the home, there are styling and decorating tips for every room. It shows you how to easily transform a simple wooden fruit crate and hooks into super-stylish kitchen storage space. The section on seating areas helps you to refresh your upholstery, and there is a whole section dedicated to plants, such an important aspect of any interior. I can't recommend this book highly enough — you don't just dream with this book, your dreams become reality."
